With 'Great Expectations'

The theme for Bertie County Schools for the 2015-2016 school year was "Great Expectations." Guest speaker Richard "Chocolate" Santana shared on August 19, 2015 how his journey from an impoverished gang member to a successful college graduate all began and ended with expectations. When crime and violence and rule-breaking and bad behavior was all that was expected for him, that is exactly what he delivered. But all it took was for one custodian to show him love and that love blossomed into inspiration and motivation and produced a productive citizen who wasn't even "supposed" to go to college.

Stereotypes play into our expecta-

tions, said Santana. He arrived to deliver his speech in a trench coat and dark sunglasses. But by the end of the speech, he had transitioned into a man wearing a white collared shirt with a neck tie.

Santana reminded teachers that from the moment a child steps into a classroom, the teacher has expectations. But he or she can set the expectations high in order to get more from their students. He also reminded teachers that they chose their professions because they wanted to make a difference in the lives of others. And he challenged them to do just that.


Meet the Board



BCS Workforce Profile



Human Resources Highlights

Professional Development Presented for Principals

The Human Resources Department hosted two professional development events for BCS principals and other administrators from area school systems last year.

In December, **“HR Hot Topics 2: Learning How to Stay out of Trouble”** featured several guest speakers:

Steve Lassiter, NC Wells Fargo Principal of the Year, discussed school culture and climate.

Attorneys from Tharrington Smith, LLP and the North Carolina School Boards Association discussed legal issues that principals face, including personnel investigations, Mandatory Improvement Plans, FMLA violations, and much more.

Gordon Millsbaugh (retired), a school personnel consultant, shared strategies for data-driven hiring.

In April, the Human Resources Department hosted training on **“Employee Discipline in an Education Environment.”** Dr. David Braswell with UPSLOPE conducted the training for certified administrators and classified supervisors. This powerful training session equipped leaders with the tools and strategies needed to proactively manage common employment-related risks.



Recruitment Strategy

On May 21, the HR Department hosted the first ever Teacher Interview Day and Expo. During this special recruitment event, candidates from 11 states interviewed for BCS vacancies. On that day, 15 preliminary contract offers were made for the 2016-2017 school year.

BECHS Students Do Ph.D-Level Lab Work

Through a partnership with North Carolina State University, Biotechnology students in Bruce Boller's lab at Bertie Early College High School are creating proteins that will someday be used in university research labs in Raleigh.

Students in Boller's lab are currently learning to insert turkey genes into non-harmful strains of E. coli bacteria to generate the protein. The bacteria are also given genes for enzymes that enable them to survive in media containing antibiotics that act as a selectable marker so students can identify the bacteria that actually possess the invisible turkey gene. Next they must grow up large quantities of the bacteria containing the protein, then extract, purify and finally quantify how much of the turkey protein product the bacteria have produced for them.

The protein is being used by Dr. Matt Koci's NCSU lab to study intestinal infections in turkeys. You see, Koci studies infectious diseases of poultry to help ensure a safe and bountiful food supply for the growing human population. The protein the students are making is thought to be important in directing the immune response to the site of infection. Koci uses the protein the students make to study a particular infection

found in young turkeys.

Boller said that his BECHS students have a unique opportunity to do real microbiology/biotechnology research. "In most labs, you get a kit, and the students follow the kit, and it works and it's cool. But in this lab, things typically do not work as planned, and when they don't, it is up to the student to figure out what went wrong. Then they must troubleshoot and figure out how to make it work through trial and error and a lot of critical thinking. That's what real science is."

The results are in ... By the end of the 2015-2016 school year, Bertie County Schools had improved from having six schools that were considered low performing to only two for last year!

Low performing districts are defined as districts in which the *majority* of schools within the unit are low performing.


We are no longer deemed a low performing district!

Low performing districts and schools in North Carolina are defined by the General Assembly and are based on the school performance grade (test scores) and the Education Value-Added Assessment System (growth) calculations.

Low performing schools are those that receive a school performance grade of D or F and have a school growth score of “met expected growth” or “not met expected growth” as defined by G.S. 115C-83.15.

In 2014-2015, no schools exceeded growth. Last year, three schools exceeded growth, and not one school received an “F” grade on the School Report Cards.

We are on the rise and are climbing steadily!

Curriculum and Instruction Department

The Curriculum and Instruction Department (C&I) provided numerous opportunities for staff and students alike to grow and improve professionally and academically.

“Master Teachers” worked with staff and students all year to analyze data and determine the needs of students. They developed strategies to meet the needs of students based on ongoing formative assessments and provided support to classroom teachers.

Title I Instructional Coach **Tonsa Walton-Gary** (Windsor Elementary School) and Elementary Instructional Coach **Nicole Hayes** helped teachers perfect their crafts throughout the school year. They helped teachers develop lesson plans and even modeled delivering lessons to students.

The C&I Department collaborated with top teachers to offer **“Saturday Academies”** for students at Bertie High School who

were in classes that are EOC tested areas: Math I, Biology and English II. The goal was to enhance content knowledge, improve understanding of key concepts and facilitate participation in tutorial sessions designed to improve performance on EOC tests.

Teachers also participated in **Professional Learning Communities**. These PLC’s met regularly to share expertise and improve teaching skills in their common content areas with the aim to achieve better results for the students they served.

“Curriculum Mapping” collaboration and professional development occurred all throughout the year with the aim of creating online Wiki pages on the BCS web site as a resources for teachers of all grade levels and subject areas. What is the culmination of two years of work is now a one-stop-shop for resources, lesson plans, assessments and pacing guides for teachers to educate our students.

The mission for the C&I Department for the 2015-2016 school year was **“Rigor Every Day in Every**

Classroom.” Staff participated in professional development on rigor in which they first defined what rigor looks like in the classroom:

- * **Each student is EXPECTED to learn at high levels through productive struggles.**


- * **Each student will be SUPPORTED so he or she can learn at high levels.**

- * **And each student will be CELEBRATED as he or she demonstrates learning at high levels.**


This definition was developed based on feedback from professional development on rigor.

The **Beginning Teacher Support Program** has a three-year induction period and includes initially-licensed classroom teachers. All beginning teachers (BTs) receive a multi-layered system of support in Bertie County, including an assigned mentor, administrators, instructional coaches, BT Support Coordinator, and Central Office staff. Key areas of focus for BTs last year were teaching strategies and formative assessments. The BT Program was led by C&I Team Member and AIG Coordinator Shirley Powell.


Class of 2016: Senior Snapshots

Making Us Proud

Taylor was the Lieutenant Commander of the Bertie High School JROTC Program. This past summer, he also attended the Summer Cadet Leadership Camp at Fort Pickett, Va., where he was a Superior.



The Governor's School of North Carolina is a five and one-half week summer residential program for intellectually gifted high school students, integrating academic disciplines, the arts and unique courses on each of the two campuses. The curriculum focuses on the exploration of the most recent ideas and concepts in each discipline, and does not involve credit, tests or grades.

To qualify for Governor's School, a student must first score in the 95th percentile on a high school EOC. Then, he or she must be nominated and complete a rigorous application process.

Summer of Science

Toward the end of the school year in 2016, **Emma Hughson** was recognized by the Board of Education for being selected to attend Governor's School for the summer. Hughson spent the

summer months at Meredith College (Governor's School East) where she studied advanced science with other teens who are high achievers.

In addition to studying physics and chemistry, Hughson also got the opportunity to choose from a variety of challenging electives this summer.



Digital Learning Day

In February, students across the county participated in Digital Learning Day. Teachers in all Bertie County Schools utilized technology in their instruction on that day. At Windsor Elementary School, students used Chromebooks to “play” a question and answer game with the instructor, called Kahoot. For this “game,” students and teacher logged in to be quizzed on topics covered. The question appears on the instructor’s screen, and students provide the answer, which is private to the teacher, electronically on their devices. The game plays a “happy” tune during Q&A, and students had fun while learning.

Community Fun Day

West Bertie had its first ever community day event on Saturday, September 19th. Tickets were 50 cents. Families were invited for a day of enrichment, food and fun! Refreshments were sold (funnel cakes, chicken sandwiches, hot dogs, soda, candy and more). The event also featured games and activities such as a train ride, a bounce house, face painting and more. It was a great way to bring the community together for support and of course, fun!

Sound to Sea

Last school year, students at Windsor Elementary School were able to take advantage of an opportunity to experience a hands-on study of ecosystems in the natural environment that is the Bogue Sound, the Maritime Forest and the Atlantic Ocean, walking literally from “Sound to Sea.”

It was an adventure for students, teachers and chaperones alike to explore and connect the world around them to the science and social studies curriculum being taught in the fourth and fifth grade levels.



21st Century Skills

The 21st Century Afterschool Program at Windsor Elementary School began in November 2015. Students in grades three through five had the opportunity to stay after school Monday through Thursday for assistance with reading, math, and science instruction as well as enrichment activities. Leaders utilized community resources, field trips, and parent support. All efforts were designed to maintain and enhance student growth.

Beta Beginnings at Bertie Middle




Last year, teachers at Aulander had extensive training in teaching writing with **Ms. Susie Wilde.** Mrs. Wilde's services were acquired from a \$9,500 grant that Gregory obtained.

Students in grades four and five benefitted from having a **STEM Science Teacher.** Students participated in many hands-on science activities and participated in relevant STEM field trips such as: visiting the WITN News Weather station in Greenville to correlate with their weather unit and visiting Briley's Farm to participate in gem stone mining. Students created catapults, spiders, and roller coasters! Roanoke Chowan Electric Company engineers came to share the engineering process with our students and East Carolina University has partnered with us to provide STEM materials and resources to enhance our program.

BHS Public Safety Cadet Program Underway

On January 25th, sixteen high school juniors began taking college courses in criminal justice, earning high school and college credits free of charge.

The Bertie Public Safety Cadet Program (BPSCP) allows students to earn a Criminal Justice Technology Correction Specialist Certificate. Their earned college credits will

count toward an associate degree in criminal justice at Roanoke-Chowan Community College or Martin Community College.

As part of the cadet program, students participate in various experiences geared toward helping to develop leadership, integrity, responsibility and a sense of community.

This pilot program, through the N.C.

Governor's Office, N.C. Department of Public Safety, Roanoke-Chowan Community College and Bertie County Schools, is aimed at keeping more young residents of Bertie County employed and near home while also developing a well-trained and eligible workforce for one of the county's largest employers—the Bertie Correctional Institution.

EMS Cadets Complete Another Successful Year



As a rising 12th grader at Bertie STEM High School, **Justin Cowan** (right) completed the EMS Cadet Program through Bertie County Schools and its partnership with Roanoke-Chowan Community College. He also obtained the EMT Basic and CNA 1 Certifications.

Vanessa Hernandez also completed the cadet program and ob-

tained her EMT Basic certification. She now works with Bertie County Emergency Medical Services.

For two consecutive years, the EMS Cadet Program has boasted a 100% pass rate.

Several of the high school students out-perform their adult counterparts on the state EMT test to obtain certification.

Transportation

The BCS Transportation Department earned an even lower (better) score on the Department Evaluation in 2015-2016 than in the previous years. The score went from 31.38 in 2015 to **27.00** in 2016. Director of Transportation William Ledford said that the lower the rating, the better. The average score for districts in the East is 39.76.

School Nutrition

The "Community Eligibility Provision" is now in its second phase. The program allows schools that predominately serve low-income children, and that meet other requirements, to offer nutritious meals at no cost to all students through the National School Lunch and School Breakfast Programs. This means **FREE** meals and no more lunch applications!

We serve a total of **1,845** breakfasts and **2,098** lunches daily to the students of Bertie County Schools. We also vend an additional **250-260** daily breakfasts and lunches to Heritage Collegiate Leadership Academy from our Bertie Early College cafeteria.



NC Pre-K Busy in Bertie

Under Title I Pre-K, Bertie County Schools implemented a **Pilot Program** for three-year-olds, designed to allow for children to have two years within the NC Pre-K. The children made considerable progress. When they were screened this year (2016) using the assessment for four-year-olds, they averaged considerably higher than those four-year-olds who were screened last year (2015). This showed that an additional year in Pre-K is beneficial for students.

Askewville Preschool has become a **Shape NC Site**, focusing on increasing healthy practices for young children. Emphasis is placed on screen time, healthy eating, outdoor play and active play. A mini-grant will assist with purchasing supplies and materials that

will help meet goals. A small garden project will be one of the activities that will be implemented to increase active play and encourage healthy eating.

The Regional Contracting Agency **Roundtable NC Pre-K Meeting**

was held at Askewville Preschool on February 23. The NC Pre-K department heads from the Department of Child Development and Early Education in Raleigh, along with NC Pre-K directors and partnerships from the Outer Banks to New Bern were in attendance. The group shared updates in regards to NC Pre-K and Early Childhood.

Each Pre-K site planned a Family Fun & Recruitment Day as its end-of-the-year activity.

Partnerships in Early Childhood Education ...

All teachers (teacher assistants included) at each site and the director are trained in Story Exploring. The training was provided through Smart Start Partnership for Children.

Motheread training was offered to parents and staff at each site. The training is provided through Smart Start Partnership for Children.

The Week of the Young Child Event was held at the Bertie Sports Complex on May 17, 2016 from 10-1. All early childhood facilities and children came together to celebrate children. This event is sponsored by Smart Start Partnership for Children.

‘Health Collaborative’ is on the Move!



“The event was a great success,” said Perry. “We had about 150 people come through. I think it was a good community-building event for Bertie County.”
